HOW IT ALL STARTED

Most projects succeed, in fact, as a result of cooperation and teamwork. The Children's Walk is one such event that the Guild started in 2002. Twenty years later the Walk continues to involve the young, due to the wonderful team spearheaded by the Guild's current Vice-President Mateja Prosek Grima.

To briefly recount how it all began: in 2002, I had completed my four years as President of the Guild. The Bazaar Chairperson that year was Mme Kirsi Madi, wife of the Ambassador of Jordan and a UN fonction-naire in her own right. She asked me to find a way of raising funds to add to the Bazaar funds. The number of appeals for donations were over 100 projects that year, capably handled by the then Vice-President Projects Marie-Claire de Stick-ere and so the thought of looking for more funds. And so the Walk.

Walking for a cause is not unique. Walks are held for a variety of causes. But the Children's Walk aimed at bringing awareness to the young and the importance of education for ALL children. The school-going children in Geneva are fortunate in access to education. The idea of bringing Women and Children, the Women's Guild and the School Children together to help less fortunate children around the world to acquire a tool to improve their future seemed natural.

The key factors that we felt the Walk would bring about were:

- To instil awareness in the children of the importance of education for all.
- To make the children Geneva aware that there are children around the world who do not have this privilege.
- To make the children in Geneva learn to listen, see and ask questions on how to help these children.
- To be able to help children in need get an education that would enable them to improve their lives. Even vocational training sometimes requires a basic high school graduation. Although governments of a good number of countries provide free education, it is mostly in primary school level.
- To hold the Walk on the UN grounds in full cooperation with UNOG, allowing the Guild to introduce to the participating children, a glimpse of the role of the UN and its specialized agencies in the world.

The children, teachers, parents and the Principals of the participating schools will be happy to know that over 500 children in over 20 countries have been helped to complete their education through the Walk funds. Huge thanks to the children, teachers, parents and the Principals of the participating schools in this venture. It is their willingness to join the Guild in realizing the success of this project that counts. I would especially like to thank the first donors who helped launch the event, Nestlè, Mme Genvieve Torriani and Aligro. And, above all, to all the members of the Guild, who volunteered their time and energy with enthusiasm to prepare for and assist on the day of the Walk year after year.

In conclusion, I feel that the Walk has motivated and involved the children here in Geneva and helped them understand the importance of education for all.



20 YEARS OF CHILDREN'S WALK

It is with great joy and pride that we welcome you to the 20th Anniversary of the UNWG Geneva Children's Walk, a milestone event that marks two decades of dedication, unity and shared commitment to improving the lives of less fortunate children around the world. "Children walking for Children" is a heartwarming event that traditionally brings together children from various international schools from the Geneva area to walk for a cause that truly matters, instilling in our youth the importance of charitable endeavours.

Funds raised through this initiative directly support educational scholarships for children entering secondary school. Each funding is for a period of 4 to 5 years maximum, which represents an important multi-year commitment on the part of the UNWG-Geneva. These crucial resources are directed towards covering school fees and ensuring no child is left behind due to financial constraints. Additionally, funds go towards supplying uniforms, school materials and books as well as providing essential food and transportation assistance. This holistic approach not only fosters a conducive learning environment but also offers a brighter future to these deserving youngsters, ensuring they have the chance to thrive and realise their potential.

In addition to raising funds, our aim is also to inspire awareness among children living in Switzerland to the struggles of other children who may not enjoy the same educational opportunities and face other challenges such as access to clean water and sanitation or proper nutrition. We believe that empowering children to take an active role in making a positive change in the world is paramount to their growth and development. Moreover, the Walk is also an educational opportunity for children to get to know the UN, its aims and programs.

The Children's Walk has been organised every year since 2002, with the exception of one year (2005) when it was cancelled due to inclement weather. Traditionally, the event has been organised on the grounds of the UNOG, however in past three years, due to the Covid pandemic as well as ongoing renovations at the UNOG as part of its Strategic Heritage Plan, a temporary format of mini-Children's Walks has been successfully implemented.

For 20 years we have been fortunate to collaborate with over 20 different schools in the Geneva area and over 10.000 children have been involved with Children's Walks. Through this initiative and other fundraising efforts, such as the Kiosk and the sale of water bottles and greeting cards, we have managed to raise over CHF 700.000 for our scholarship fund.

The beneficiary schools of the Children's Walk initiative exemplify its global impact and commitment to education, Over the years we have collaborated with 22 educational institutions spanning 21 countries, extending our reach to diverse corners of the world. Through these partnerships, we have been able to provide invaluable scholarships to over 500 students, enabling them to complete their secondary school education.

The Children's Walk is not just an event, it is a bridge that connects communities and educational institutions around the globe, uniting them in a shared mission to make quality education accessible to all, regardless of their circumstances. I invite you to delve into this humble, yet inspiring testimony of UNWG's twenty-year journey alongside Geneva schools and all the beneficiaries, witnessing the difference made in the lives of children through the power of education.

CHILDREN'S WALK THROUGH THE YEARS

For the past two decades the UNWG was fortunate to be working with many wonderful educators from various international schools from the wider Geneva area who have tirelessly mobilised and encouraged children to participate in our Walks. Their unwavering commitment to this noble cause has not only enriched the lives of countless young activists but also contributed significantly to the success of this remarkable initiative.

The event has traditionally been organised on the grounds of the UNOG, where children from various schools in Geneva walk in circles, each round representing a symbolic journey towards educational dreams. With every lap they collect stamps, turning their steps into a tangible representation of their dedication. In return, their sponsors, often parents and friends, commit to financial support with these stamps. In addition to fundraising for scholarships, the event has also raised awareness and promoted a culture of solidarity among children in Switzerland in favour of impoverished and disadvantaged children around the world. Before each Walk, children are shown a presentation of beneficiaries of UNWG scholarships. This represents an important tool to engage students to actively participate in the Walk and to be able to discuss the benefit of their action with their peers, parents and friends when asking for donations.

Since 2002, through this remarkable initiative, the UNWG collected more than CHF 700,000 for scholarships. Moreover, more than 10,000 children from the international schools in Geneva participated in the annual Walks.

- Q Do you have any idea how else we could help children who live in poor conditions around the world?


We could share all of our money.


- Q Is the feeling of helping others a good feeling? Yes. It is a happy feeling.

Q Is the feeling of helping others a good feeling? Yes, the feeling of helping others is a good feeling.




Iyaloo, Salma and Aida from The British School of Geneva

For several years, The International School of Geneva has participated in the Children's Walk for Children organised by the ladies of the UNWG. It has been a very positive experience for all our students.

We have the Primary Years Programme for our curriculum. In the year 4 class-room, the students study the Rights of the Child. The Right to Education is so important and all our students can easily identify with the importance of learning and the opportunities it brings. When they learn that many students around the world do not have the same access to education for whatever reason, they are genuinely moved. A big part of our programme asks that students take action connected with their learning. Although the walk is an adult inspired event, the way the students participate is a genuine and authentic action based on their understanding of the needs of others.

Since Covid, we have organised the walk in our own school grounds. One benefit of this is that more students have been involved including older students organising the route and face painting. Parents have also come along to run or walk the route with their children. In the school there is real excitement about the event. Our parents have been exceptionally generous in sponsoring the students. For many of them it is the first sponsored event in which they have participated. On the day itself, the students start with a big group warm up, then half the year group take on the role of stamping the cards while the other half start their walk. We have a route that is approximately 750 metres in length. Last year, one student did 15 laps. After one hour, the roles are switched and the walkers become the stampers. The whole event is exciting, with other students and parents cheering on the walkers. Handing over the funds raised is also a very exciting moment.

Last year we were very fortunate to have a visit to the U.N. itself for the 20th anniversary celebration. Sitting in the big hall was an absolute privilege and highly memorable for our students. To be in Geneva and to be able to visit the United Nations buildings is so very special. We would like to thank all the ladies from the UNWG for all their support and for the opportunities they have given us to make learning come alive for our students."

CÉLÉBRATION DES 20 ANS DE LA MARCHE DES ENFANTS

La célébration des 20 ans de la Marche des Enfants a été l'évènement marquant de l'exercice 2023 pour le CFNU. En effet, en date du 16 mai 2023 le CFNU a organisé, en collaboration avec l'ONU et dans son enceinte, un évènement regroupant plus de 400 enfants des écoles internationales genevoises (Collège du Léman, Ecolint: Campus La Châtaigneraie, Nations et Pregny, Institut International de Lancy et British School of Geneva) ayant participé à la marche des enfants. Cet évènement avait pour objectif de célébrer les enfants et leur engagement. Ainsi, le Comité d'organisation a fait appel à cinq jeunes pour animer cette matinée. Bravo à Rachelle, Denise, Bridget, Adam et Nick, qui étaient très professionnels sur scène et ont captivé le public.

Après le message d'accueil de Mme Ajkuna Thanati, Présidente du CFNU, Mme Tatiana Valovaya, Directrice générale de l'ONUG et Présidente d'honneur du CFNU a fait une intervention sur les droits des enfants et les problèmes que rencontrent certains enfants dans les pays pauvres pour accéder à l'éducation, elle a également salué les efforts du CFNU et la mobilisation des Ecoles dans cette initiative. Mme Gita Sundararaman, fondatricede la Marche des Enfants et ancienne Présidente du CFNU a par ailleurs expliqué à l'assistance la naissance de la Marche, ses objectifs et son évolution à travers les années. Mme Mateja Prosek Grima, Responsable de la marche des enfants a fait une présentation détaillée sur les principales réalisations des 20 ans de la marche avec des données chiffrées sur les montants collectés, les enfants participants et le nombre des enfants bénéficiaires

L'assistance a été captivée par tous ces messages et une belle énergie se dégageait de la salle surtout quand des représentants des différentes écoles ont présenté avec beaucoup d'enthousiasme les droits et responsabilités des enfants qu'ils ont souhaité mettre en avant. A rappeler que cette année, le CFNU a choisi comme thème pour la marche des enfants « Les droits et responsabilités des enfants ». L'objectif étant de sensibiliser les enfants à leurs droits et obligations. Des réunions de travail ont été organisées avec les enseignants dans les différentes écoles et des cercles ont été remis aux enfants afin d'illustrer chacun le droit et la responsabilité qui lui paraissent importants.

Cette matinée festive a été agrémentée par des chants des enfants. La chorale de l'Ecolint Campus des Nations et de Pregny a envoyé un message puissant sur l' avenir en chantant "I'm the Earth". Toute la salle a également chanté en chœur "We are unstoppable", "Toi + Moi" et "On Ecrit sur les Murs". L'événement s'est achevé avec la création du "Mur des droits et responsabilités" où les enfants ont épinglé sur le mur leurs interprétations et expressions diverses de leurs droits et responsabilités. Les enfants avaient des étoiles plein les yeux et certains ont même décrit ce jour comme étant l'un des meilleurs jours de leur vie. Et nous partageons ce même sentiment.

La réussite de cet évènement s'est illustrée également par la collecte des fonds dédiés aux bourses scolaires du CFNU grâce aux généreuses donations des enfants, leurs parents et familles. 


